 phlebotomist. Agencies should check with their insurance companies regarding any

- According to the Moberly Area Community College (MACC) program requirements, final acceptance and enrollment will be contingent upon the following:
 - Background Check
 - General Health Physical by Medical Provider
 - o 10+ Panel Drug Screen with negative results
 - Immunizations (TB and others)
 - Other requirements as determined by MACC and the assigned clinical location
- Requalification training will take place every two (2) years.
- Is the online training full time or can I work my regular job while completing it?
 - The online six weeks of training is not a full-time endeavor. You will have assignments, quizzes, activities, and potentially discussion boards you will have to complete in required time frames but you can do it at your convenience (i.e., 2:00 am, 11:00 pm, etc). You just have to make the commitment to meet the deadlines and complete the requirements as directed by the instructor.
